Rising early, 17 young staff from the Surf Dive and Ski Company put in 90 minutes of weeding and planting with Coolum and North Shore Coast Care volunteers before heading off to work. In the dunes behind the off leash dog beach there is a patch of unrestrained asparagus fern, a garden escape with prickly stems, sweet smelling flowers and bright red berries. Council provided tools, gloves and plants. CaNSCC volunteers shared their weeding and planting expertise with the visitors and Nadia Joyce and Brendan Stephan from Council supervised.

"It was a great team building exercise, we came from stores from Caloundra to Noosa Heads and we want to do this more often," the group's spokesperson said.

Stumers Dunes Bush Regeneration Co-ordinator Birte Spencer says a small group of CaNSCC volunteer weed every Thursday.

"The task is overwhelming, with this special help, in 90 minutes we filled 12 sacks with weeds and planted 32 seedlings. Community helpers are always welcome, even if just once a year," she said.

Quandong Jam Recipe



Ingredients:

500g Quandong Fruit
1 Lemon
2 Granny Smith Apples
600g Castor Sugar
300ml Water
15g Aust Fruit Spice

Method:

Combine fruit, sugar, water and lemon juice in a saucepan. Bring to the boil then simmer. Allow to simmer on a low heat for 2 hours.

Remove from the stove, blend if required. Be sure to leave some chunky pieces of apple and quandong in the jam. Allow to cool and add spice.



Fundraising for Sekisui Appeal

The Yaroomba community continues to fight the Sekisui development approval with a court appeal. This appeal has been brought forward by the developers and may possibly be as early as September. Fundraising has been underway for some time with great community support but there is still a considerable shortfall in funds.

The implications of the density and height of the Sekisui House development in its approved form is far reaching. The Sekisui development proposal as it currently exists will herald the end of what is presently the longest dark stretch of beach in the Sunshine Coast Council region. The cumulative impact of light glow (both direct and indirect) of seven story buildings will impact nesting endangered loggerhead turtles.



The groups formally appealing the decision on the community's behalf are Development Watch and Sunshine Coast Environment Council. Four expert witnesses have been engaged to argue for the case of Town Planning, Visual Amenity, Traffic, and Marine Turtles.

This court case, the community verses the BIG end of town, will have long term repercussions for other proposed developments along the Sunshine Coast and perhaps beyond.

We can not afford to lose this case but to win we will need your financial assistance as a matter of urgency.

School's In at Mudjimba

Coolum and North Shore Coast Care have been hosting students and teachers from the St Andrews College Year 11 Geography Excursion for a number of years and this year we had 40 keen students participating at Mudjimba.

The beach management strategies in relation to fencing, access paths and the viewing platforms are well established at Mudjimba as is the regular dune care work by volunteers from the local group.

Rosa and Peter Sorenson, Gay and Tony Gibson presented on coastal management and adaptation strategies with the focus on the ecosystem conservation approach. The significant impacts of population growth and climate change were highlighted by presenters and their teachers.



After the presentation the three teachers and the community conservation volunteers supported the students in undertaking three tasks:

Firstly, a transect analysing dune vegetation from the top of the dune to the sea just south of Power Park.

Secondly, an assessment of the human impacts from the timber viewing platform and beach access 124.

Thirdly, interviews were undertaken as part of a public survey of park users, local shopkeepers and passers by.

We hope some of these young people become dedicated to environmental science, horticulture, coast care or just having a love of the coastal native fauna and flora resulting from these types of learning experiences.

Plant It - Available Now at the Coolum Community Native Nursery

Acacia Hubbardiana - Prickly Moses

Form/Size:

Shrub 1 to 2 metres tall by 1 metre wide

Features: Dainty, spreading shrub with reddish branches and fine foliage with tiny triangular leaves. Ball-shaped pale yellow flowers with a faint sweet perfume in Winter & Spring. One of the first wildflowers in Spring. Useful frog pond plant and small bird habitat. Tolerates poor drainage.

Vegetation: Coastal Wallum

Aspect: Full sun/filtered sun

Geology: Adaptable
